Disturbances:



Officers responded to a neighbor dispute between two males on Creek Road. One male went on a tirade and began shouting and swearing at his male neighbor. According to witnesses, the out of control male was clearly the aggressor. He was upset at the neighbor, believing the neighbor had recently called the police to complain about him. He was charged with disorderly conduct.

A motorist found a three-year old child wandering in the intersection of Hwy 41 and Hazeltine Blvd early only morning at approximately 1:00 AM. Thankfully, the child was not injured and was in good health. Police arrived to take custody of the child. Officers were able to locate the child's residence, after the child pointed (literally) them in the right direction. Contact was made with the child's parents. They responded with the appropriate disbelief and relief one would expect from a parent just learning a child had been found in a roadway. The child had walked out of the home after walking through a child security gate, which had mistakenly not been in place. Officers did not have any concerns with leaving the child with the parents, as they vowed to rectify the situation. There are no charges and the information was forwarded to Carver County Social Services.

Officer Lawrenz Catches Burglars

On Thursday, August 12th, Officer Josh Lawrenz investigated a daytime residential burglary, recovered the stolen property and arrested two juvenile suspects. A Riverview Terrace resident returned home around noon to find that his home had been broken into and electronics had been stolen. Officer Lawrenz located a witness who was able to give a description of the suspects and a possible address where the suspects went. Officer Lawrenz continued his investigation, recovered the stolen property and later, after the suspects returned to their residence, arrested two of the three burglars. This crime was quickly solved thanks to Officer Lawrenz's initiative and excellent police work.

Theft from Vehicles Solved

On Wednesday, August 4th, Officer George and Sergeant Carlson responded to a report of an out of control 16-year-old and ended up recovering numerous items of stolen property. The 16-year-old was incoherent due to ingesting psilocybin mushrooms and prescription medications. While making sure the youth was safe, Officer George and Sergeant Carlson learned that the 16-year-old was in possession of numerous items of stolen property. They recovered almost 100 suspected stolen CDs, perfume, sunglasses, electronics and knives. Detective Rachel Nelson then took over the investigation and ultimately arrested a 19-year old and a 16-year-old, for stealing from vehicles.
